## Powering On/Off the Projector

### Powering On the Projector

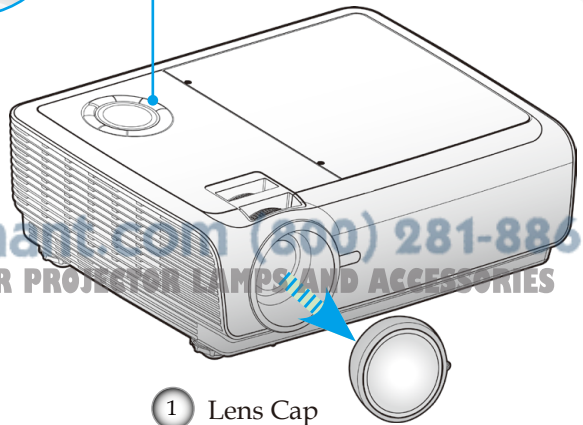
1. Remove the lens cap. ❶
2. Ensure that the power cord and signal cable are securely connected. ❷ The Power LED will be Red.
3. Turn on the lamp by pressing “⏻” button either on the top of the projector or on the remote. The Power LED will flash Blue.

The startup screen will display in approximately 10 seconds. The first time you use the projector, you can select your preferred language from quick menu after the startup screen display.

4. Turn on your source (computer, notebook, video player, etc.). The projector will detect your source automatically.
- ❖ If you connect multiple sources at the same time, press the “Source” button on the control panel to switch between inputs.

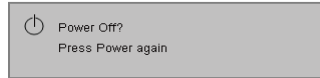

## Powering Off the Projector

1. Press the “⏻” button to turn off the projector lamp, you will see a message displayed on the projector’s screen.



Press the “⏻” button again to confirm.

2. The cooling fans continue to operate for about 10 seconds for cooling cycle. When the Power LED turn Red, the projector has entered standby mode.

If you wish to turn the projector back on, you must wait until the projector has completed the cooling cycle and has entered standby mode. Once in standby mode, simply press “⏻” button to restart the projector.

3. Disconnect the power cord from the electrical outlet and the projector.
4. Do not turn on the projector immediately following a power off procedure.

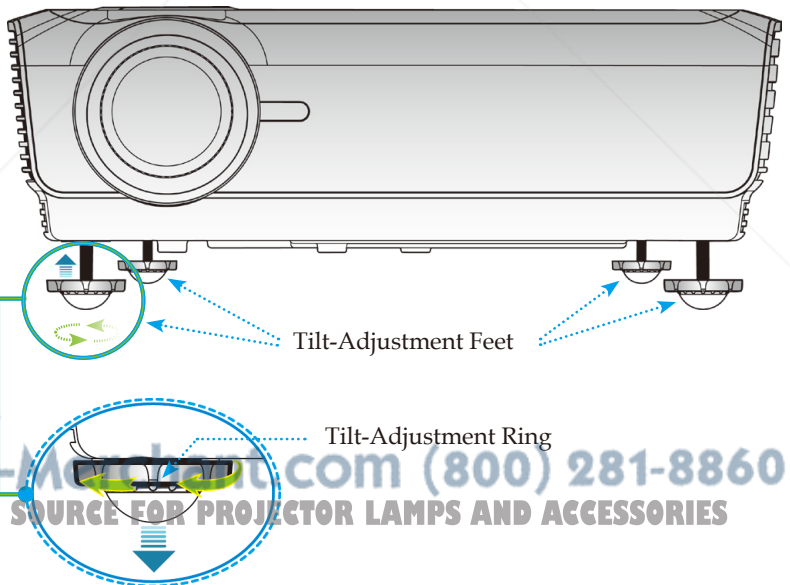
## Adjusting the Projected Image

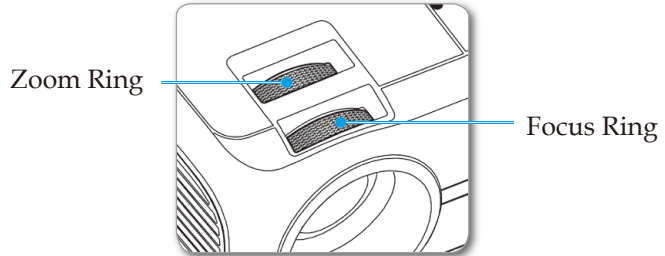

3. Reset the projector on its feet and re-adjust as needed.



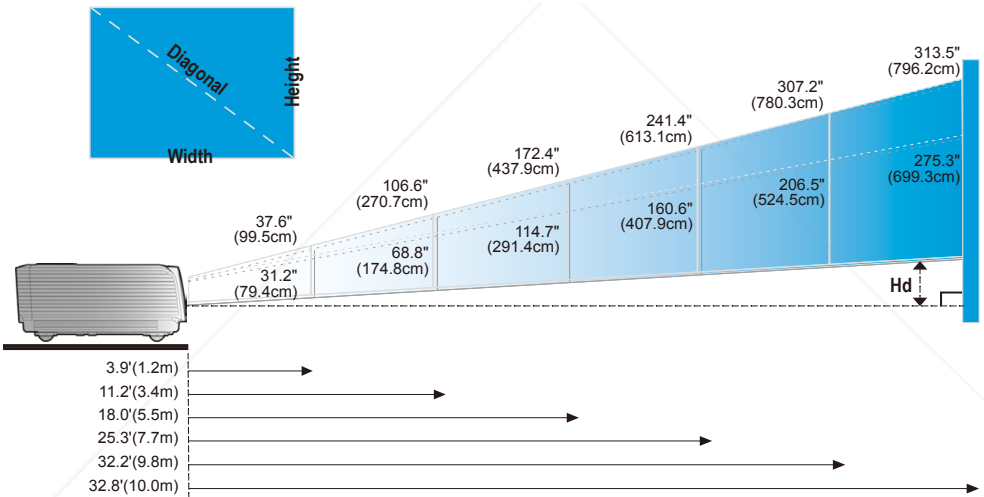

### Brightness

Adjust the brightness of the image.

#### **[?]** Partial, scrolling or incorrectly displayed image

- ▶ Press “Re-Sync” on the remote.
- ▶ If you are using a PC:

For Windows 95, 98, 2000, XP:

1. Open the “My Computer” icon, the “Control Panel” folder, and then double click on the “Display” icon.
2. Select the “Settings” tab.
3. Verify that your display resolution setting is lower than or equal to UXGA (1600 x 1200). (\*)
4. Click on the “Advanced Properties” button.

If the projector is still not projecting the whole image, you will also need to change the monitor display you are using. Refer to the following steps.

5. Verify the resolution setting is lower than or equal to UXGA (1600 x 1200).

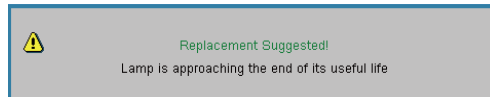
## Remote Control Problems

### **?** If the remote control does not work

- ▶ Check the operating angle for the remote control is approximately  $\pm 22.5^\circ$ .
- ▶ Make sure there are no obstructions between the remote control and the projector. Move to within 6 m (20 ft) of the projector.
- ▶ Make sure the batteries are inserted correctly.
- ▶ Replace weak batteries in the remote control.
