

14. Outdoor Antenna Grounding

If an outside antenna or cable system is connected to the product, be sure the antenna or cable system is grounded so as to provide some protection against voltage surges and built-up static charges. Article 810 of the National Electrical Code (U.S.A.), ANSI/ NFPA 70 provides information with regard to proper grounding of the mast and supporting structure, grounding of the lead-in wire to an antenna discharge unit, size of grounding conductors, location of antenna-discharge unit, connection to grounding electrodes, and requirements for the grounding electrode.

15. Lightning

For added protection for this product (receiver) during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet and disconnect the antenna or cable system. This will prevent damage to the product due to lightning and power-line surges.

16. Power Lines

An outside antenna system should not be located in the vicinity of overhead power lines or other electric light or power circuits, or where it can fall into such power lines or circuits. When installing an outside antenna system, extreme care should be taken to keep from touching such power lines or circuits as contact with them might be fatal.

17. Overloading

Do not overload wall outlets and extension cords as this can result in a risk of fire or electric shock.


The **HELP** (?) button on the remote control can be used in two ways. You can press the **HELP** (?) button independently to display the EZ HELP feature. However, when the **MENU** is already displayed, you can press the **HELP** (?) to show the EZ HELP feature.

The EZ Help feature:

- 1. Press the HELP (?) button on the remote control to display the EZ Help screen.
- 2. Scroll up and down to select EZ Help menu items by using " \blacktriangle \blacktriangledown "on the thumbstick of the remote control.
- 3. Move the highlight by using " \blacktriangle \blacktriangledown " on the thumbstick. The explanations of the highlighted item will be displayed on the right side or at the bottom of the screen.
- 4. Press the **EXIT** button on the remote control if you want to return to TV viewing.

Status indicators

Lamp indicator, operation indicator and temperature indicator at front button of the LCD projection TV show the user the operating status of the LCD projection TV.





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Front Audio/Video Jacks

There are four jacks on the right side of your Entertainment Machine that make connecting Audio/Video devices like video games and camcorders very simple.

The jacks are like those found in the jack pack on the back of your Entertainment Machine. This means that most equipment that connects to those types of jacks in the rear jack pack, can also be connected in side.


To use the side jacks as the signal source, use the Main Source menu as described on page 22. They will be named "Front Video" in the Main Source menu.



When you choose Front Video or Front S-Video, the audio is automatically changed as well.



If you're connecting a video game unit, make sure to change the picture settings with the EZ Video option in the Video menu (see page 30).



Mini glossary


A/V CABLES Audio/Video cables. Three cable connectors—Right audio (red), Left audio (white), and Video (yellow). A/V cables are used for stereo playback of videocassettes and for higher quality picture and sound from other A/V devices.

A/V DEVICE Any device that produces video or sound (VCR, DVD, cable box, or television).

ANT / CABLE Hookup

Connect the Entertainment Machine to your antenna as shown.

Turn to page 26 to tune your ANT / CABLE antenna.



If you receive your RF signal through an antenna that is several years old and connects with two small prongs, you will need to purchase a 300 to 75 Ohm adapter. It should be available from your local electronics dealer.

Zenith recommends using a 75 ohm cable for your antenna connections in order to prevent interference.

CABLE BOX


Some cable services require the use of a cable box to decode premium channels and pay-per-view. Using the Loop Out to Decoder option, and programming your remote, you can connect your cable box so that you only need your MBR remote to control all the channels. By connecting cable directly to your Entertainment Machine, then running it out to the cable box and back, you make the cable box another source to choose from in the Source selection on your remote.

- Locate the Antenna/Cable 2 jack on the back of your TV. Connect the cable that runs from the wall directly to the jack.

 Now find the Loop Out jack.
- Connect the cable from this jack to the Input jack on the back of your cable box.
- Locate the Output jack on the back of your cable box. Connect this to the Antenna/Cable 1 jack on the back of your TV
- To view the premium stations, press the TV button on your remote and select the other Cable source (Ant/Cable 1). Then set the channel number on your cable box to HBO, CINEMAX, SHOWTIME, etc.

To view the non premium channels press the TV button and select Ant/Cable 2. Then run EZ Scan to check for all available channels and store them in memory.

This can be combined with any other equipment you may want to hook up. Hook cable directly into the TV, then to the cable box. From there, the cable box goes to the next device, down the line, until the last piece, which connects back to the TV in the Antenna/Cable 1 jack.



VCR+CABLE BOX

Locate the Antenna/Cable 2 jack on the back of your TV. Connect the cable that runs from the wall or antenna to the jack.

Now find the Loop Out jack.


Connect the cable from this jack to the Input jack on the back of your cable box.

Locate the Output jack on the back of your cable box. Connect this to the RF or VHF/UHF/CATV In jack on the back of your VCR.

If you want to connect VCR with TV directly, Connect the cable from the Loop Out jack to the RF or VHF/UHF/CATV In jack on the back of yor VCR.

Find the composite video and audio jacks on the back of your VCR, and connect them following the instructions provided with your equipment.

You may connect either the composite video or the S-Video cables to your Entertainment Machine. (Do not connect BOTH the composite and the S- Video cables. In the event that you connect both composite and the S-Video cables, only the S-Video will work.)





To hear stereo sound from cable or your VCR, you will need to connect A/V cables as well as the wire that runs from the VCR to your Entertainment Machine.



If you want to receive your signals on Channel 3 or 4, locate the Out to TV jack on your VCR. Connect a cable from the Out to TV jack to the Antenna/Cable 1 jack on the back of your Entertainment Machine.




After connecting external equipment to the TV, don't display still word for hours. It may be show the split word.

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
DVD Player



HD-SET TOP and PC Hookup

TO watch the DTV, connect HD-SET TOP to COM-PONENT INPUT2 or PC/DTV INPUT of your TV.



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External Stereo

Hook up Left/Right Front Speaker to Amplifier System.


- Locate the Variable Audio Out jacks on the back of your Entertainment Machine and the Input jacks on the back of your stereo's amplifier.
- Connect the two jacks, making sure that the right and left channels are placed correctly.
- Set up your speakers through your stereo, according to those directions.



Room Setups for Home Theater

This is just a general room design. Any number of set-ups are possible, and some changes may be needed to maximize your sound. However, a Dolby Digital Receiver is needed for 5.1 channel audio.

A left and right speaker on either side of the set enhances separation. The Entertainment Machine "center mode in," makes the dialog sound as thought it's coming directly from the Entertainment Machine. The rear surround sound speakers provide the majority of other sounds, like those from special effects in movies. Your sub-woofer generates ultra-low frequency sound, for rumbling low-end audio.





Sound is affected by speaker placement, so make sure nothing is in front of the speakers, and that they are aimed in appropriate directions.



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Monitor Out


- Your Entertainment Machine has a special feature which allows you to hook up a second TV or monitor.





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

Front Panel Controls

- Press the OK buttons as the ENTER buttons on your remote control.
- Use the vol button as the VOL buttons on your remote control.
- Press the ch buttons as the CH on your remote control.
- This is the operation indicater. (See page 6).
- This is the lamp indicater. (See page 6).
- This is the temperature indicater. (See page 6).

The POWER, CHANNEL and VOLUME buttons work just as they do on your remote control.


Main Source

Changes the screen source for the main screen so you can watch your off-air TV, cable TV, VCR, DVD, or any other devices that you have hooked up to your TV.

You can also change the screen source by pressing the screen source buttons on the remote control.



- Press the MENU button on the remote control, then use the UP/DOWN arrow button to select the Setup menu.
- Press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow button to access the Setup menu.
- Use the UP/DOWN arrows to select Main source.
- Press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow to access the Main source screen. Your choices are: Ant/Cable 1 (Ant/Cable 2), Video 1, Video 2, Front Video, Component 1, Component 2 and RGB-PC.
- Press EXIT to save and return to TV viewing or press the LEFT arrow to save and return to the previous Menu.



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
PIP Source

Changes the screen source for the Picture-In-Picture screen so you can watch your off-air TV, cable TV, VCR, DVD, or any other devices that you have hooked up to your TV.

You can also change the PIP screen source by pressing the PIP button on the remote control.



- Press the MENU button on the remote control, then use the UP/DOWN arrow button to select the Setup menu.
- Press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow button to access the Setup menu.
- Use the UP/DOWN arrows to select PIP Source.
- Press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow to access the PIP source screen. Your choices are: Ant/Cable 1, Video 1, Video 2, Front Video, Component 1, Component 2.
- Press EXIT to save and return to TV viewing or press the LEFT arrow to save and return to the previous Menu.



PIP/POP/SPLIT

PIP (Picture in Picture) / POP (Picture out of Picture) / SPLIT modes let you watch main picture and sub picture at the same time.



- Press the LEFT/RIGHT arrow to select CH+/-, Swap, Source or Move.

 To change programs of sub picture is possible only when PIP signal source is NTSC RF signal.
 If you want to change a program of main picture, press pg up/dn button.
 - Swap: Press the UP/DOWN arrow to swap main and sub picture by.




Automatically finds analog channels available through antenna and cable inputs, and stores all active channels on the channel list.




Use pages 10-14 to hook up your Entertainment Machine. If you have not done so, plug in your Entertainment Machine into a 120V 60Hz outlet.



If you have not done so, remove the back of the remote and put in two AA batteries. Make sure batteries are properly installed (check the +/- signs).



- With the remote control in hand, press the POWER button to turn on your Entertainment Machine.
- Press the MENU button on the remote control, then use the UP/DOWN arrow button to select the Setup menu.
- Press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow button to access the Setup menu.
- Use the UP/DOWN arrows to select EZ Scan.
- Press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow to access the EZ Scan screen. Your choices are: ANT1 Air, ANT1 Cable, ANT2 Air ANT2 Cable

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Channel Add / Del / Surf






Create two different types of channel lists-custom list and surf list-from the default channel list made in the EZ SCAN menu.

A custom list can be created by toggling each channel on or off with (Enter). Once a channel is highlighted, you will be able to see whether the channel is currently added or deleted by referring to the small window at the top-left corner of the screen.

You can create your own surf list with up to 16 channels. It appears at the bottom-left corner of the screen.

Press the Surf button on the remote control when a channel is highlighted to add or delet the channel.

- Press the MENU button on the remote control, then use the UP/DOWN arrow button to select the Setup menu.
- Press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow button to access the Setup menu.
- Use the UP/DOWN arrows to select Channel Add/Del/Surf and then press ENTER or right arrow.
- You will now see a screen filled with numbers and a preview screen. Use the UP/DOWN and LEFT/RIGHT arrows to select any given channel.
- Press EXIT to save and return to TV viewing or press MENU to save and return to the previous menu.



Channel Label






Chooses preset labels for your channels.

Use Channel +/- on your remote control in the CH Label menu to select a channel for labeling, and choose a suitable label for your channel by pressing

to set the label to the selected channel.

- Press the MENU button on the remote control, then use the UP/DOWN arrow button to select the Setup menu.
- Press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow button to access the Setup menu.
- Use the UP/DOWN arrows to select CH Label.
- Press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow to access the CH.Label screen.
- You will now see a screen filled with Labels and a preview screen. Press channel UP/DOWN button on your remote to select the channel to Label.
- Use the UP/DOWN and LEFT/RIGHT arrows to select the appropriate label for the channel and press ENTER to set the Label to the selected channel.
- Repeat steps five and six until all channels are Labeled.
- Press EXIT to save and return to TV viewing.




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EZ Link

Lets you adjust the picture quality settings to suit your preference and viewing situations.




First, you can manually adjust the levels of picture quality settings, such as Contrast, Brightness, Sharpness, etc.

Second, you can select the preset value in the EZ Video menu based on the program category.

- Press the MENU button on the remote control, then use the UP/DOWN arrow button to select the Video menu.
- Press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow button to access the Video menu.



AUDIO Menu

Lets you adjust the sound to suit your taste and room situations.



- Press the MENU button on the remote control, then use the UP/DOWN arrow button to select the Audio menu.
- Press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow button to access the Audio menu.
- Use the UP/DOWN arrows to select one of the following options. Your options are: Bass, Treble, Balance, EZ sound, EZ sound Rite, Audio Mode, Front Surround and Internal Speaker. Then press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow button.
- Use the LEFT/RIGHT arrows to adjust your preferences and use UP/DOWN select your preference (Bass, Treble, Balance).
- Press ENTER arrow to save your choices and return to the previous menu.



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AUDIO Menu



- Bass: Increases or decreases the lower frequency sounds of the TV speakers. Increases in bass, for example, make percussion stand out.
- Treble: Increases or decreases the higher frequency sounds of the TV speakers. Increases in treble, for example, make voice or string sounds stand out
- **Balance:** Lets you adjust the left to right balance of the TV speakers.
- **EZ Sound:** Lets you choose the sound settings manually.

Custom: Lets you adjust the picture settings manually.

Normal: Restores the sound levels to their original settings.

Stadium: Stresses high frequency sounds and front surround sound to creat a sense you would experience in a stadium.

News: Increase high frequency sounds to emphasize the human voice. **Music:** Increase both high and low frequency sounds to stress the sounds of musical instruments. Theater: Stresses both high and low frequency sounds, in addition to the front surround sound, to creat a sense you would experience in a theater.

- **EZ Sound Rite:** Scans for changes in sound level during commercials, then adjusts the sound to match your current audio level of the TV program you are watching.
- Audio Mode: Lets you choose the default audio mode for conventional analog programs. When you view a program broadcast in mono, you will hear only mono sound, even though Stereo mode is set. When Second Audio Program(SAP) mode is set, the program's second audio program, usually the program's dialog in another language, if provided, is broadcast in mono.
- Front Surround: Increases the front surround sound to create more open and expanded.
- Internal Speaker: Allows you to toggle the TV internal speakers Stereo, Center or off. If you want to use your external hi-fi stereo system, turn off the internal TV speakers. However, you may use the internal TV speakers as a center speaker to create a surround effect.

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

- Press the MENU button on the remote control, then use the UP/DOWN arrow button to select the Special menu. Or press RATIO button to instantly access the Aspect Ratio menu.
- Press ENTER or the RIGHT arrow button to activate the Special menu.

 - Zoom1 Choose when you want to view the picture without any alteration. However the top and bottom portion of the picture will be cropped.
 - Zoom2 Choose when you want the picture to be altered, both horizontally enlarged and vertically cropped.
 The picture taking a halfway trade off between alteration and screen coverage.
- Press EXIT to save and return to TV viewing or press the ENTER button to save and return to the previous menu.



Lets you choose the way that an analog picture with a 4:3 aspect ratio is displayed on your TV with a 16:9 ratio. When you receive an analog picture with a 4:3 aspect ratio on your 16:9 TV, you need to specify how the picture is to be displayed according to your preference.



Lets you select your preferred language for the menus from a choice list.

- Lock On/Off: Activates or disables all the blocking scheme you set up previously.
- **Set Password**: Changes the password by inputting a new password twice.
- Movie(MPPA): Blocks movies according
 to the movie ratings limit, so children
 cannot view certain movies. You can set
 the ratings limit by blocking out all the
 movies with the ratings above a specified
 level. Keep in mind that the movie ratings
 limit only applies to movie shown on TV,
 not TV programs, such as soap operas.
- TV-PG(Children): Keeps children from watching certain TV programs among only the programs intended for children, according to the ratings limit. This rating does not apply to other TV programs. Unless you block certain TV programs intended for mature audiences in the TV Rating General menu, your children may view those programs.
- TV-PG(General): Blocks certain TV programs that you and your family do not want to view, based on the ratings.
- Block Channel: Blocks any channels that you do not want to view or that you do not want your children to watch.
- Aux. Block: Enables you to select a source for blocking among the devices you have hooked up.





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Parental Lock



TV-Y7 (Directed to Older Children): This program is designed for children age 7 and above.

TV-G (General audience): Most parents would find this program suitable for all ages.

TV-PG (Parental guidance suggested): This program contains material that parents may find unsuitable for younger children

TV-14 (Parents strongly cautioned): This program contains some material that many parents would find unsuitable for children under 14 years of age.

TV-MA (Mature audience only): This program is specifically designed to be viewed by adults and therefore may be unsuitable for children under 17.

G (General audiences) : All ages admitted.

PG: Parental guidance suggested. Some material may not be suitable for children.

PG-13: Parents strongly cautioned Some material may not be appropriate for children under 13.

 ${\bf R}$ (Restricted) : Children under 17 requires accompanying parent or adult guardian.

NC-17: No one 17 and under admitted.

TV-Y (All Children): This program is determined to be appropriate for all children.

X : Adult admitted only.

NR: Not rated movie.

Programming the Remote

The remote control of your HD receiver is a multibrand or universal remote control that can be programmed to control most remote-controllable components of other manufacturers.

Note that the remote control may not control all models of other brands.

1 Test your remote control.


To find out whether your remote control can operate component without programming, turn on the component such as the VCR and press the corresponding mode button (VCR) on the remote control while pointing at the component. Test the **POWER** and **CH** +/-buttons to see if the component responds properly. If not, it requires programming.

- Turn on the component to be programmed. Then press the corresponding mode button on the remote control.
- Press the POWER button and the MUTE button simultaneously. Then the remote control is ready to program the code for the corresponding component.
- There are two ways to find the right code of the component.

First, if you press the **CH** +/- buttons repeatedly, the code will change one at a time. Press the POWER button after each code change. If the right code is found, the device will turn off.

Second, enter the code number using the digit buttons on the remote. The right code numbers for the corresponding component can be found on the following pages. Again, if the code is correct, the device will turn off.

- Press the EXIT button to store the program.
- Test the remote control functions to see if the component responds properly. If not, repeat from step 2.

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Maintenance

Early malfunctions can be prevented. Careful and regular cleaning can extend the amount of time you will have with your new Entertainment Machine. Be sure to turn the power off and pull out the plug before you begin any cleaning.

SCREEN CLEANING

- 1. Here's a great way to keep the dust off your screen for a while. Wet a soft cloth in a mixture of lukewarm water and a little fabric softener or dish washing detergent. Wring the cloth until it's almost dry, and then use it to wipe the screen.
- 2. Make sure the excess water is off the screen, and then let it air-dry before you turn on your Entertainment Machine.

CABINET CLEANING

- 1. Use a soft cloth with a mild soap solution to wipe the cabinet.
- 2. Rinse the cloth and wipe the cabinet again.
- 3. Let the cabinet air-dry before turning the Entertainment Machine on.

WOOD CABINETS

Use a quality wood cleaner and polish. This will protect the Entertainment Machine from dirt and dust, as well as keep the cabinet looking new.

EXTENDED ABSENCE



If you leave your Entertainment Machine dormant for a long time (such as a vacation), it's a good idea to unplug the power to protect against possible damage from lightning or power surges. If you use an off-air antenna, you may also want to disconnect it from the back of your Entertainment Machine before leaving.

Maintenance cont'd

PICTURE INTERFERENCE

Even though you may be getting cable, the signal may be weak, which means the quality of your picture may suffer due to other factors. If there are problems with the image on your Entertainment Machine, consult the Troubleshooting guide on the following pages.

VIDEO GAMES AND OTHER FIXED-PATTERN DISPLAYS

If you use your Entertainment Machine to play video games or for other uses that have single, fixed images, such as a photo-CD player, you should avoid setting the Brightness level too high. If static images, like network identification patterns, are left sitting for too long, they can leave a permanent impression on the picture tube. You can reduce the chance of this happening by limiting the amount of time you use the fixed-image display, and by reducing the contrast and brightness levels.



If you unplug your Entertainment Machine, you may have to reset the clock using the Time menu described earlier.

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Troubleshooting

Some quick and easy tips to fixing problems yourself.

SYMPTOMS	SOLUTIONS
Snowy picture and unclear sound.	 Check your antenna connection or location. Check your cable input. Check to see if the TV/VCR button on your VCR has the TV selected.
Multiple images or 'ghost shadows.'	 Check your antenna direction and/or location. Check your cable input. Make sure the cable from your antenna to your Entertainment Machine is properly connected.
Interference: Sharp lines across the screen and unclear sound.	The following may cause image problems or distortion: Electrical appliances, powerful lights, cars, trucks; computers or portable phones; medical equipment • If possible increase the distance between your Entertainment Machine and the offending appliance. Or shut one of them off.
Normal picture but no sound.	 Check volume levels. Make sure the TV is not Muted. Try another channel. The problem may be the broadcast, not your Entertainment Machine. Are the Audio A/V cables properly installed? Are the wires for external speakers (if you have external speakers) properly installed? Make sure your speakers turned on under the Audio menu. If your audio mode is set to SAP, that channel may not have a SAP program.
No picture and unclear sound.	 Are you in TV or cable tuning mode, and should be in the other? Make sure output channels on all A/V equipment are on the same channel (3 or 4) Check that all connections are tight.
No picture and no sound.	 Is the AC power plugged in? Check that your AC power outlet works. (Test it by plugging in something else or try another plug.) Make sure your brightness and audio controls are set properly. Try another channel. The problem may be with the broadcast.
No color, but the sound is O.K.	 Check the color control in the Video menu. Try another channel. The problem may be with the broadcast.
Picture has a big black box on it, but the sound is O.K.	• The CC (closed caption) option may be in Text mode. Select Caption 1, or OFF in the Captions/Text menu.
Picture has two horizontal black bars, one on top and one on bottom.	 Your program is in letterbox. This means that the shape of your TV is a square, but the program is a rectangle. Think of the bars as empty space the program doesn't fill; not picture that's blocked out. Because this format is a direct representation of film as you see it in the movies, you are actually seeing MORE of the program when you see those bars.
Missing Secret code	• If you forget the secret code, press the remote control Button '7', '7', '7' and '7' when the display asks you to enter the secret code.

Troubleshooting, cont'd

Remote control doesn't work.	Make sure the batteries are fresh and installed properly.
Menu options can't be changed or selected.	Try unplugging your Entertainment Machine for a few minutes, then plug it back in.
No picture or sound when any non-cable source is selected.	 Check to see if the source equipment has been turned on. Make sure that the connections are secure on the back of your Entertainment Machine and on the source equipment.
Weak or no Stereo Sound when using a stereo VCR.	 Check to see if all the connections are secure. Look in the Audio mode menu to see if all the settings are correct. You are using channel 3 or 4 to view your VCR. No stereo sound is present under that decision.
The PIP inset is black or lacks contrast.	 You might want to adjust the PIP picture settings under the PIP menu. Check that all the wires are connected properly. Check to see if your input source for PIP is set correctly.
The PIP inset is "snow" when the source is Antenna 1.	•Look to see if the TV/VCR button on your VCR has the TV selected or change the PIP to another source.
Time is incorrect.	Make sure the time was set initially. Probably power was lost.

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Glossary

A complete list of definitions for words found in this guide.

75 OHM RF CABLE The round cable that comes from an off-air antenna or cable service

provider. Each end looks like a hex shaped nut with a wire sticking through the middle, and it screws onto the threaded jack on the back of

your TV.

A/V CABLES Audio/Video cables. Three cables - Right audio (red), Left audio (white),

and Video (yellow). A/V cables are used for stereo playback of videocassettes and for higher quality picture and sound from other A/V devices.

A/V DEVICE Any device that produces video or sound (VCR, DVD, cable box,

or television).

ADD This function lets you add new channels to the list that you'll scroll

through when using your remote.

AMPLIFIER An external device that amplifies sound from a television, CD player, VCR,

DVD or other A/V device.

ANALOG TV Traditional method of representing a television signal as a replica (analog)

of the original picture and sound.

ANTENNA The physical receiver of television signals sent over the air. A large metal

piece of equipment does not always have to be visible for your home to

be using an antenna.

ASPECT RATIO The ratio of the horizontal dimension to the vertical dimension of a pic-

ture. Standard television in the U.S. today is generally transmitted and displayed in a 4:3 aspect ratio. High-Definition television will normally be

formatted in a wider aspect ratio, assumed to be 16:9.

CAPTIONS A form of subtitling that writes out the dialog for your program.

CONVERGENCE This option lets you correct for color separation in your picture.

DELETE This function lets you remove channels that you don't watch from the list

you'll scroll through.

DIGITAL TV A new method of representing television signal as a series of binary num-

bers (1s and 0s). This method allows for the signal to be manipulated to eliminate redundancy to dramatically increase picture and sound quality.

DOLBY DIGITAL Dolby Digital Cinema Sound is made possible by a new digital coding tech-

nique called Dolby AC-3. Dolby AC-3 produces high-quality, 5.1 channel surround sound which is six discrete separate channels for a full range of sound. Each channel can carry a different signal simultaneously (front center, front left, front right, surround left, surround right and subwoofer).

INPUT Refers to the jack that receives a signal into the TV, VCR or other

A/V device.

JACK A connection on the back of a TV, VCR, or any other A/V

device. This includes the RF jacks and the Audio/Video jacks

that are color-coded.

MODE The mode determines the type of device (TV, VCR, Cable, Aux)

MONO SOUND Mono (monaural) sound is one channel of sound. On more

than one speaker all the speakers play the same audio.

OUTPUT Refers to the jack that sends a signal out of a VCR, DVD, or

other A/V device.

PIP This is the most common way to refer to the Picture-In-Picture

(PIP) option.

PIP SNAPSHOT Press to capture and freeze main picture within large PIP

frame. Press a second time and receive normal PIP from anoth-

er channel. Press again to remove PIP from the screen.

SECOND AUDIO

PROGRAMMING/SAP

Second Audio Programming (SAP) is another, separate, audio channel available with some programming. Choosing SAP often

refers to listening to audio in another language, such as

Spanish or French.

SIGNAL Picture and sound traveling through cable, or on the air, to

your television screen.

SOURCE The term for the equipment that provides audio and video

information to your Entertainment Machine. Antenna, VCR,

DVD players, or Cable Boxes are examples of sources.

STEREO SOUND Stereo (stereophonic) sound refers to audio that's divided into

right and left sides.

SURF This function creates a customized list of your favorite chan-

nels. You can access this group of channels by pushing the

surf button on the remote.

TEXT Arbitrary text not related to the program.

TUNER Any device that picks up broadcast signals and turns them into

picture and sound.
